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Councilmembers,

My name is Jim Markel. I'm an owner at Red Oxx and a long-time investor in the East Billings Urban Renewal District.

I'm writing to support BIRD and to oppose any move that would pull EBURD management into a centralized office at City Hall.

East Billings did not become a TIF district by accident. This area lived through decades of underinvestment and being overlooked while other parts of town moved ahead. The only reason we're finally seeing signs of life here is because we have had **dedicated, district-focused management** that understands the plan, the people, and the conditions on the ground.

Red Oxx, and I personally, have invested significant capital and time into this district based on that understanding. We did it with the belief that:

- TIF dollars generated here would be stewarded here,
- Decisions would be aligned with the EBURD plan
- The work would stay close to the businesses and property owners who are actually taking the risk.

Centralizing management of all TIF districts into one office and one person at City Hall would cut against that. It may sound efficient on paper, but in practice it dilutes focus, weakens accountability, and takes us right back toward the pattern that created the need for EBURD in the first place: this district being ignored while other priorities win the attention.

Right now, EBURD is finally showing momentum. We are seeing private investment, jobs, and visible improvement in an area that sat still for too long. This is the worst possible time to weaken the structure that made that progress possible.

I respectfully ask you to:

1. Keep EBURD's management structure independent and district-focused.
2. Ensure that TIF funds generated here stay aligned with the EBURD plan and are not diverted away from the work this district still needs.
3. Involve BIRD and EBURD owners directly in any discussion of structural changes, rather than making a broad administrative move that treats every district as if it had the same history and needs.

We are not asking for special treatment. We are asking you to honor the original purpose of this district and the commitments that encouraged private investors like us to put real money and effort behind it.

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Councilmembers,

I am writing as a resident and taxpayer of Ward 5, as well as a property owner and taxpayer whose business is located within the EBURD. I want to express my strong support for the continued structure of the EBURD and EBIRD Tax Increment Financing (TIF) districts—specifically the model that relies on a dedicated district liaison who reports directly to the City Council.

This structure has proven to be effective because it keeps decision-making close to the people who live, work, and invest in these districts. A liaison who is accountable to the Council—and by extension, to the public—ensures that priorities remain aligned with the grassroots needs of the community rather than filtered through a third-party organization or a centralized city staff position overseeing multiple districts.

Since their inception, the EBURD and EBIRD districts have demonstrated measurable, sustained performance. The districts have supported catalytic private investment, improved infrastructure, and helped transform previously underutilized areas into active, economically productive corridors. These gains did not happen by accident—they are the direct result of consistent community engagement, transparent oversight, and a governance structure that keeps the focus on local priorities. The return on investment within these districts shows that when taxpayers have a clear voice and a direct line to decision-makers, the outcomes are stronger, more efficient, and more widely supported.

Each urban renewal district in Billings has its own history, challenges, and opportunities. The EBURD and EBIRD districts in particular have benefited from hands-on engagement, transparent communication, and direct responsiveness to the residents and businesses who fund these improvements through their tax dollars. Maintaining a liaison dedicated to these districts preserves that connection and keeps the focus on:

- Community-driven priorities
- Accountability to taxpayers
- Transparent communication with stakeholders
- Tailored support for the unique needs of each district

Shifting oversight to a third-party entity or consolidating management across all three districts risks diluting the local voice that has been essential to the success of EBURD and EBIRD. The people who live and invest in these neighborhoods deserve representation that is specific, accessible, and directly connected to the Council.

As both a Ward 5 resident and a business owner within the EBURD, I have seen firsthand how this structure empowers local stakeholders and ensures that taxpayer

dollars are invested where they make the greatest impact. Preserving this model means preserving the community-driven momentum that has allowed these districts to grow and thrive.

#### **Members of the Citizen Police Advisory Board**

My name is Tasheena Duran. I am writing to request your review regarding serious concerns about police conduct, evidence handling, and accountability in the death of Cole Stump.

Over the past several years, I have gathered police reports, dispatch records, timelines, evidence logs, and medical findings related to this case. When these records are compared, they conflict with one another. Officer statements do not align with documented timelines, physical evidence does not match portions of the official narrative, and key aspects of the incident and investigation remain unclear.

There are gaps in evidence handling, inconsistencies in use-of-force reporting, and contradictions across official records that have never been explained or independently reviewed.

Several public records requests connected to this case remain incomplete, leaving important documents outstanding.

Local efforts to obtain clarity and accountability have gone nowhere, which is why I am requesting civilian oversight review.

I am asking that this matter be examined using the records already available to determine whether proper transparency and accountability were followed.

I am prepared to provide timelines and documentation.
