Meet new RNTF Board Member at Large - Dave Schwarm:

“Hello, my name is David Schwarm, and I have been a resident in the Rimrock Neighborhood for 43 years. IMPORTANT INFO FOR 2024 MONTANA PROPERTY TAX PAYERS:

If you paid 2024 property taxes in Montana, by now you should have received a letter from the Montana Department of Revenue regarding the rebate authorized by Senate Bill 542. The rebate is up to \$400.


Eligibility requirements for the rebate are spelled out in the letter.

15 pages of public comment received from RNTF members were recently forwarded to the City for consideration during the Transportation Corridor Plan. While most concerns were about Rimrock Road, other roadways also received comment.

Scott Aspenlieder, City Council Ward 4 and MDOT Transportation Commissioner will be at our September 17th meeting to discuss the Hwy 3 Corridor Plan.


FRIENDS OF THE STAGECOACH TRAIL



Stagecoach Trail Northwest Connector Rimrock Rd to Zimmerman Park.

HDR Engineering is completing plans for the Stagecoach Trail build and cites 3 options. (See Rendering below).

The current plan is to break ground Spring 2027. Billings City Council will decide whether or not to sign construction contracts in the Summer 2026. A group of interested parties is forming the '**Friends of the Stagecoach Trail**', with the common interest to see the trail completed and monitor its maintenance needs. All are welcome to join the group at friendsofstagecoachtrail@gmail.com. The first meeting will be in late September or early October.

Walk, Bike, or Roll to School—Safely

As kids head back to school, it's a great time to build safe, healthy routines—like walking, biking or rolling to school. Physical activity among children in Yellowstone County continues to decline, yet daily movement helps kids arrive more focused and ready to learn.


The Yellowstone County Safe Routes to School Committee partners with schools and families to improve safety and promote active transportation. Creating safer school zones and encouraging healthy habits starts with small steps at home and in the community.

Whether you're a parent, student or driver, we all share responsibility for keeping school routes safe. Here are a few reminders:

- **Cross at intersections and use marked crosswalks whenever possible.**
- **Make eye contact with drivers before stepping into the street to ensure they see you.**
- **Wear bright or reflective clothing, especially during early morning or evening hours.**
- **Plan walking or biking routes in advance and practice them with children to build confidence.**
- **Drivers should slow down in school zones, stay alert and eliminate distractions.**

Walking, biking or rolling to school leads to fewer cars near schools and means cleaner air and safer streets for everyone.

Daylis Stadium Fundraising Campaign





Daylis Stadium, nearing its 100th year, has long stood as a cornerstone of the Billings community, hosting generations of athletes, students and fans. As the home field for three high schools, it has been the backdrop for countless championships, Friday-night lights and community gatherings. Its rich history and deep-rooted tradition make it more than just a stadium—it's a symbol of Billings' pride and passion for sports.

Daylis Stadium is a central part of Billings' athletic and community history but has not seen major upgrades in decades. The stadium's outdated bleachers, facilities and accessibility limitations create barriers for fans, athletes and visitors.

With expanding school and community use, demand for a functional and inclusive stadium has outpaced the facility's current capacity. The need for improved seating, locker rooms, concessions and safety measures is critical.

Our Vision

Build a modern, accessible and safe stadium that serves Billings' students, athletes and the broader community for years to come.

- ❖ Track Expansion - increased lane capacity to host state-level track events
- ❖ Enhanced Lighting & Sound - upgrades to improve visibility and quality
- ❖ Modernized Facilities - New & modernized locker rooms, restrooms, concessions & ticketing.
- ❖ New Bleachers - Reinforced & expanded seating for a better game day experience.


